Need for the Rule(s): ORS 279A.050 (6)(c) grants OPRD authority to procure all goods, services, public improvements and personal services relating to state parks. ORS 279A.070 authorizes the agency to adopt rules necessary to carry out the provisions of the Public Contracting Code.

Fiscal and Economic Impact: None is anticipated. These rules changes are minor housekeeping updates and streamlining of the public contracting process for greater efficiency


Statement of Cost of Compliance:
